As many of you know, 2022 sees the 25th Anniversary of the creation of Bath Rugby Supporters' Club (BRSC), being the official independent Supporters' Club of Bath Rugby with our income derived solely from Membership subscriptions. BRSC is proud and delighted to enjoy an excellent relationship with the Management, Staff and Players of Bath Rugby.

What follows is primarily intended as a tribute, to all the original and early Members of BRSC, and to thank them for 'kicking off' what we are now able to benefit from today. Equally, I would like to dedicate these few words to all the Members of BRSC, past and present who had the 'vision' to support the "Best Rugby Club in the World".

To focus our minds, it might be helpful to quote our own 'Vision' and 'Objectives', as detailed in the BRSC Constitution, which are as follows:

<u>Vision</u>

To promote the growth, development and standing of the Bath Rugby Supporters' Club by furthering the interests of its Members at every opportunity, and by a continuing programme of proactive engagement with Bath Rugby Management at all levels, whilst retaining its independence.

Objectives

To identify, understand and promote the interests of the Members.

To provide activities and services for the benefit of those who support Bath Rugby, including

- the organisation and delivery of a range of social events
- an effective communications strategy with an active, current Website and social media presence
- organising fundraising activities in support of the BRSC nominated charities
- supporting all of the players and teams of Bath Rugby, on and off the pitch
- liaising with Bath Rugby to represent supporters' views, foster mutual understanding, and act cooperatively to deliver the best possible match day experience
- assisting supporters wishing to travel to away fixtures or special events by publishing information provided to BRSC relating to transport services
- fostering good relations with rugby supporters throughout the world

I think you'll agree, quite a challenging agenda!

Whilst I have been an ardent supporter of Bath Rugby for more years than I care to remember, I have only been closely involved with the BRSC Committee for three years, now that I have 'hung up my boots' and therefore, gratefully, have the time to indulge my 'passion'.

It occurred to me a while ago now that whilst I am 'learning the ropes' of the current Committee and its workings, I knew relatively little about its creation and the early days of BRSC. That's when I got the idea of contacting a small, random selection of 'long-term' BRSC Members to gather their reminis-cences, memories and anecdotes, and with their permission, share them with you, our 'wider rugby family'.

In gathering these recollections, it has involved exchanges of emails, letters, photographs and even visits to the homes of some supporters. First and foremost, I must say a hearty thank you to all our contributors for their time and effort – I'm sure you will enjoy reading their stories, it may also bring back some memories of your own.

Professionalism in the game of Rugby Union 'kicked off' when the 'International Rugby Football Board' (now 'World Rugby') met in Paris between 24th - 26th August 1995. Following this conference, and almost exactly 100 years after the 'Great Schism' that split rugby into two codes, former World Rugby Chairman, Vernon Pugh declared that Union would become "an open game", with England international and Bath Rugby's Mike Catt, becoming the game's first fully professional player.

Mike Catt, whilst born in Port Elizabeth, South Africa on 17th September 1971, had an English mother. He joined Bath Rugby in 1992 as understudy to the then England fly-half Stuart Barnes and made his debut against Northampton, aged 21. After a stellar career with Bath Rugby, Mike Catt joined London Irish in 2004.

BRSC is one of the largest independent supporters' clubs dating back 25 years, having been formed in 1997, some 18 months after the game turned professional. Our aim then was to maintain links between the club, its players and the supporters.

Prior to the game turning professional, the clubs relied upon its Membership for volunteers to act as an integral part of the club's management and structure, Bath Rugby was no different. Post professionalism brought new challenges to both the supporters and the clubs – the potential for a disconnect between the two was obvious and thus Bath Rugby Supporters' Club came into existence.

BRSC is and always has been, independent from Bath Rugby, a supporters' club run by supporters. Today we exist to identify, understand and promote the interests of Bath Rugby and our Members, providing services and activities for all who support Bath Rugby.

BRSC is proud of its status as an independent supporters' club and enjoys an excellent, and much appreciated working relationship with Bath Rugby.

So, Bath Rugby has played a pivotal role in the professional game since its inception and Bath Rugby supporters have steadfastly stood by the Club ever since, through 'thick and thin' and with the cooperation of our contributors, I hope the following will help uncover some of "The Good, The Bad and The Ugly".

SUPPORTERS' CLUB

Between 1984 - 2006

David and Anita Murray recall many of Bath Rugby's 'Glory Days' when the Club frequently ended the season in the play-offs at 'HQ' (Twickenham) and being thrilled at the skills of Jeremy Guscott, Stuart Barnes, Andy Robinson, Jonathan Webb, Tony Swift (who still holds the record as Bath Rugby's top try scorer with 161), Graham Dawe and Matt Perry. Many of these players had jobs locally, arranged by the Club (Stuart Barnes was the local Building Society Manager) and the much-respected Malcolm Pearce, who sadly passed away on 17th February 2022.

David & Anita Murray (BRSC Membership Nos. 34 & 35)

(Editor's Note: Much of this time was when Jack Rowell coached Bath between 1978-1994 and John Hall was Club Captain. John Hall was appointed 'DOR' of Bath Rugby in 1995/96 and Jack Rowell returned to Bath Rugby as 'DOR' in 2002. BRSC is delighted that John Hall became its President at the 2022 AGM).

Late 1980's

David Murray became a Member of Bath RFC in the late 1980's and had a seat in the West Stand which he, together with several other members, subsequently gave up at the request of the Club, as they wanted to allocate them to sponsors. David then decided to become a Season Ticket Holder (STH) and chose a seat in the East Stand.

David was joined by his wife (Anita) as a STH in the early 1990's and over the succeeding years, both went on to develop long lasting friendships with those regularly sitting around them.

Anita Murray recalls Referee, Ashley Rowden being subjected to good natured banter from the crowd and whilst, in a totally 'professional' manner, Ashley never openly acknowledged it, was clearly laughing. Ashley Rowden is now a Sports Commentator and 'After Dinner Raconteur' but holds the accolade of being the "longest serving referee in English rugby union history".



The "Bath Rugby 48-6 Club" was formed in a pub in Richmond, London on 17th December 1994 and was so called as this was the score when Bath Rugby beat Gloucester Rugby in the final of The Pilkington Cup (on 5th May 1990). The aim of the "Bath Rugby 48-6 Club" remains to "Promote friendship within the game of rugby".

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<u>1996</u>

The saying "Allez-Bath" started in 1996 and was **<u>BEFORE</u>** Wasps also adopted it.

Jan & Mike Warrington (BRSC HLM Membership Nos. 63 & 64)

David & Anita Murray remember, following the game turning professional in 1995, the arrival of Andrew Brownsword who became the first "owner" of Bath Rugby in 1996 with a majority shareholding – the remaining shares were held by Members of the amateur Club as of October 1995.

In 1996, David & Anita Murray retired and moved from Frome, Somerset to Derbyshire, where they still live, although occasionally return to Bath but still take a keen interest in the fortunes of Bath Rugby.

David & Anita Murray (BRSC Membership Nos. 34 & 35)

Pre-1997 – (pre-Bath Rugby turning professional and pre-BRSC being formed)

Anne Kirkham (ex-Membership Secretary) – "There had been a thriving Supporters' Club for many years when the Club was amateur – once Bath Rugby turned professional the relationship between the players, coaches etc. and the supporters changed".

Hence, BRSC was formed.

Anne Kirkham (ex-BRSC Membership Secretary)

<u>1997</u>

Sue Andrew (and her late husband Richard, who was Membership Secretary), were also Founder Members of BRSC. "Initially, there was a lot of concern and 'grumbling' about what 'Professionalism' would mean but a group of people, of mixed ages, who had been involved with Bath Rugby for some time, got together to do something positive".

Sue remembers, "Many early mornings in August & September sending out precious little booklets with tear-off tickets for each game, using labels provided by Alan, at the Club". They also helped as Stewards, on the gates on match days, enjoying the camaraderie with supporters as they entered the ground. "The supporters felt a degree of ownership of the Club and with professionalism that was suddenly swept away".

Sue Andrew (BRSC Membership No. 1)

Jan Cattermoul attended the first ever meeting of BRSC in 1997 and helped out in the early days. Jan remained as a BRSC Member for 30 years, although has now had to give up her Membership. Jan, then living in Bristol, travelled to support Bath Rugby.

One of Jan's favourite players was Joe Maddock, who as we all know, has now returned to Bath Rugby, as Attack Coach for season 2022/23.

Jan Cattermoul (was BRSC Membership No. 14)





Jan & Mike Warrington used to live in Weymouth and travelled to support Bath Rugby but one of the reasons to move house back to Trowbridge, was to be nearer Bath Rugby. Both Jan & Mike were Committee Members during their close association with BRSC.

Jan & Mike Warrington (BRSC HLM Membership Nos. 63 & 64)

"I was aware that the formation of a Club was happening but never put my hand up to do anything useful – my excuse was that I lived in South Wales. However, it wasn't long before Jerry Keeling was badgering me to succeed him as Chairman".

"I almost fell for it but thought my period of office would coincide with the future of The Rec. being decided with the resultant media attention – so, chickened out. I needn't have worried, we are still waiting 25 years later".

Inevitably, most Members best memories are of the year 1998, and why?

There was a certain rugby match played on 31st January 1998 at the Stade Lescure, Bordeaux, where some 36,500 rugby fans watched as Andy Nicol (Bath Rugby Captain) lifted the Heineken European Cup after the result:.

Sue Andrew recalls that Bath Rugby Supporters' Club wanted to produce something for the final that would help identify BRSC Members and "let our colours shine out" – hence, the 'Wigs' were created! Sue told me, bags full of wigs were taken with the supporters, plus small flags, which were deposited all over Bordeaux, on the morning of the match.



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In the above photograph is (from L to R) Sue Andrew, Jan Warrington, Jan Gregory and AN Other (in a yellow shirt), unless of course, you can name this person? They are pictured in a French pub, 'preparing' for the match, all sporting their 'Wigs'.

Having 'trained and prepared' thoroughly, BRSC Members made it to the Stade Lescure in good time for the game and the photograph on the previous page shows a capacity crowd in the Stadium, moments before kick-off. The atmosphere inside the ground was "electrifying".

Much was reported in both the local press and back at home. 'Passions' were, understandably running very high and to this day, memories are crystal clear.

"Nothing could beat the 1998 Heineken Cup Final in Bordeaux. I was on a high for weeks after that. I did a 'there-and-back' in the day, flying out of Bristol, having got my children out of schools in Brecon and Monmouth and back again in the process. I have a treasured photograph from the Chronicle of the Bath section of the crowd going wild at the final whistle with the scoreboard in the background. It's the one I'd go back into a burning house to retrieve".

"Bath Rugby didn't expect to win the Final, so had made no arrangements to celebrate their victory – David White and his fellow supporters were in McDonald's in Bordeaux, when in walked the Bath Rugby team, to get some food!"

Needless to say, much 'celebration' was imbibed after the match, as the photograph below indicates, it's leuan Evans recovering 'the morning after', with a strong, black French coffee!

Still in 1998, Sue Andrew remembers the first function the new Supporters' Club was allowed to run at The Rec. It was a buffet meal for all attendees, cooked and prepared by the Committee Members (especially Jan Gregory, whose cooking was "sublime"). After that session the Supporters' Club was required to use the Club caterers, if they wanted to provide refreshments!

At a game in and against Toulouse, at the time of the French Student riots, Jan & Mike Warrington remember getting caught up in a tear gas attack by French Police – at the same game they also remember Raymond and Maureen Perry getting lost in Toulouse and were faced with a Police water canon heading towards them, in an effort to control the riots!

Jan & Mike Warrington (BRSC Membership Nos. 63 & 64)

I mentioned above about the "Bath Rugby 48-6 Club", well, the first outing of their Union flag, that was thankfully recovered and restored to its rightful owners, was at the Heineken Champions Cup Final, in Bordeaux in 1998 – "a much loved and revered flag". David White is pictured far left, proudly wearing his B, B & W wig.

Sue Andrew was elected Chair of BRSC at the AGM on 3rd September 1999 (Andy Robinson, Bath Rugby First Team Coach, was guest speaker) for season 1999-2000. Penny Brunton was elected as Secretary at the same AGM.

Jan and Mike Warrington remember a game against Gloucester Rugby when Barbara Hill & Sue Guscott managed to consume 7 (seven) bottles of wine between them, on the coach travelling to the game! 

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<u>2001</u>

Jan & Mike Warrington were responsible for organising 'Away' coach travel for BRSC and continued for 18 years, ending in 2019. They attributed their success to a "very friendly atmosphere amongst the travelling supporters". I think the raffles (with good prizes) held on every coach and the on-board wine, might also have had something to do with it!





Jan Warrington would book a 40-seater coach, originally from 'Stones Coaches' of Bath and then on-sell the seat tickets. Jan & Mike told me, the first ever coach they organised was to Newport (South Wales) with a seat cost of £3.00 per head. Over the years they organised coaches to Newcastle, Sale, Scotland, Ireland and France and many more grounds – they once took 10 full coaches to a game against Wasps!

After 'Stones Coaches', Jan & Mike Warrington used 'Hatts Coaches' from Chippenham and then 'Berkeley Coaches' from Paulton.

During their 18 years organising 'Away' coaches they raised a total of £20,000.00 for various Charities – so, an enormous well done and thank you to Jan & Mike Warrington for all their efforts.

<u>2002</u>

David White remembers the ever-popular evenings when referees Tony Spreadbury (k/a 'Spreaders'), who refereed at the 2003 Rugby World Cup and Ed Morrison (who refereed the 1995 Rugby World Cup Final and in 1998 became England's first full-time professional referee) were visiting speakers to BRSC, when jokes flowed one-a-minute recounting why they couldn't 'Ref' at The Rec., or the Memorial Ground.

On one particularly memorable occasion 'Spreaders' told of the time he "Yellow Carded" the entire "Shed" and received a sharp rebuke from his bosses for doing so!



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In December 2021 'Spreaders' was appointed EPCR's "Head of Match Officials" when he left his position as "Head of Professional Game Match Officials" at the RFU. BRSC is delighted and proud to confirm that 'Spreaders' still returns to The Rec., every year and gives up his evening to entertain BRSC Members with his "Ask the Ref" presentation, to update us all on the rule changes being introduced the following season. ('Spreaders' last "Ask the Ref" evening at The Rec., was on Tuesday 26th October 2021 and BRSC will be inviting him again towards the end of 2022). The "Bath Rugby 48-6 Club" flag was taken to New Zealand to support the British and Irish Lions tour in 2005. It was a very wet and cold day, and the Lions lost the test but at the final whistle, the "Bath Rugby 48-6" Club" Members watched in sheer horror, as a group of "All-Blacks" fans stole the flag. Club Members gave chase but lost the perpetrators in the crowd. Steve Eades (then Chair of the '48-6 Club') emailed the Christchurch Herald Newspaper pleading for them to publicize for its return. On the Saturday of the second test in Wellington, Steve Eades was in his hotel room when he received a telephone call from "Penny, in Christchurch" to say that a very 'sheepish' All-Blacks supporter had handed it in, and the newspaper had arranged to put the flag on an aeroplane from Christchurch and couriered it to Wellington (some 270 miles). At 6.00pm that evening, about 90 minutes before the second test kicked off, the courier arrived at the hotel, with the flag. It then made its way to the second test. Unfortunately, it didn't help the result as New Zealand 48 v 18 Lions, (their highest recorded score against the Lions). The "All-Blacks" were totally dominant and it was probably the finest ever performance from a young man called Dan Carter, who amassed a personal 33-points haul. BRSC has been proud to continually raise funds for nominated Charities, over many years, as the picture above confirms – this was a cheque for £13,000.00 raised for and presented to, Bath Rugby Community Foundation on 8th May 2010. My research reveals this cheque was presented before the Guinness Premiership match between Bath Rugby 39 v 3 Yorkshire Carnegie (Attendance: 11,700).

However, the take-up of booked coach seats was very disappointing with the majority of trips having to be cancelled for lack of numbers, making it uneconomic to run them. BRSC is currently discussing with Centurion Travel Ltd. the possibility of continuing this venture and we are hopeful that 'Away' coaches will run, to selected games, in season 2022/23. So, as Julian Trump says, we may be able to offer you more 'good fun' and enhance your match day experience by joining us on the 'Away' coach travel.
